




If there is anything that I have learned about Evangelization, or learning anything new for that matter, . . . is that it does not happen unless an opportunity is presented to an individual. I had two opportunities to participate in retreats at Our Lady of Peace during the Archbishop's Annual Vocation retreat. Funny enough, our current Vocations Director, Father Jeff Eirvin, was the one who told me about the retreat while he was on his pastoral year as a Deacon.

Our Faith is a tradition passed on by the testimony of others, but it would be difficult to create an environment for that to happen without Our Lady of Peace being the host that brings us together. The Franciscan Sisters created the opportunity and environment for me to enter into prayer and discernment so that I could hear clearly if our Lord was calling me to the priesthood.


I have now been to the retreat center as a two-time discerner, seminarian, deacon, and most recently as a priest, to support the men discerning. Meeting other men that have heard a call to spread the Gospel and lead virtuous lives is a rare opportunity, but the annual discernment retreat is just that sort of opportunity.

In that same light, this importance of brotherhood and fraternal support is an important component in faithfully living one's vocation. Recently, I have had the privilege to be a founding member in a new Archdiocesan endeavor named The Society of St. Leo the Great. Part of the aim of our society is fraternal support, prayer, common living, and a well-balanced approach to supporting brother priests to live out their vocation to the fullest by having the accountability of a fraternal bond.

RETREAT HOUSE NEWS

— *The time had come!* —

In late winter, after 68 years in operation, the 700-gallon hot water tank at OLP that serviced the retreat house had reached its final days.

On the morning of March 2, Sister Agnes Clare noticed a large amount of water on the boiler room floor. The leak was coming from the hot water tank! After further inspection it was determined that the leak was due to a failure of the heat exchanger tubes located in the tank. The age of the tank required a replacement. Repair of the old tank was not feasible.

Many thanks go to the team at Hunter Davisson. They confirmed the problem and expedited the project, so that the installation would be completed by April 1. (Meanwhile, we cancelled our March Women's retreat.) The workmen removed the old tank and replaced it with two new ones. Electric sawing and flying sparks entertained us as we observed the process. The new system is independent from the main boiler and includes two identical systems that will supply a large volume of hot water, and a level of redundancy. If one system is out of service for any reason, the other system can supply all the hot water needed for the Retreat House.



During recent storms in February, two large trees and multiple smaller trees came down in the forested area around the Stations of the Cross pathway. A crew of thirteen Knights from Holy Trinity, St. Cecilia, Hillsboro, St. Pius X and St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Councils all helped clear the fallen trees. Three truck loads of cut up wood were hauled away, while the branches and debris were the compost pile. Another team of Knights cleaned leaves from the roof and gutters of the storage shed. The following weekend, a team from Holy Trinity and Hillsboro chipped the branches and debris, to be used for ground cover. Star Rental in Hillsboro, provided the chipper at a significant discount. The remaining cost of the chipper was paid for by an anonymous donor from the Holy Trinity Knights. 
Saying Farewell

Sister Mary Cecilia Lee, OSF of the Assumption

August 20, 1920 — March 20, 2021

Sister Cecilia Lee, the eldest living member of our congregation, passed away peacefully at the Convent of the Franciscan Missionary Sisters of Our Lady of Sorrows in Beaverton, the evening of March 20, 2021. The rosary and Mass of Christian Burial were held here at Our Lady of Peace Retreat and the burial was at Mt. Calvary Cemetery.

Sister Cecilia was born on August 20, 1920, in the city of Ling Ling in the province of Hunan, China. Her parents, Philip and Maria Lee, had 10 children. Of the surviving children, Sr. Cecilia was the second eldest. Two died in infancy and three during early childhood. Later her brother Philip drowned at the age of 26 in a river, when trapped in quicksand. Joseph and Thomasus, her remaining siblings, predeceased Sister some years ago.

Sister Cecilia received her elementary education at Sacred Heart School in Hunan, HengYang. She had six years of formal education. When not at school, she helped her father by wrapping the soap that he made and sold in two provinces. She also helped her father's friend make toothbrushes out of pigs' hair, by threading the hairs through a bone handle.

On August 24, 1939, at age 19, Sr. Cecilia entered religious life, the newly formed Congregation of the Franciscan Sisters of Our Sorrowful Mother (later changed to the Franciscan Missionary Sisters of Our Lady of Sorrows). Some of her school friends later entered religious life with her: Sr. Clara, Sr. Theresa and Sr. Agnes. Egyptian Franciscan Sisters instructed the novices in their formation, and Bishop Raphael Palazzi, the founder of their new congregation, often visited to give further instruction.

Sister Cecilia professed first vows on March 19, 1943 in HengYang. However, from 1944 until 1946, she and the other sisters dispersed as they fled the Japanese invasion. Sr. Cecilia and Sr. Angela Lee fled to Ling Ling to her Father's house. Three days later, Sr. Cecilia, her family and Sr. Angela, her close friend, fled to the mountains (Dao Hsien) many miles away. They walked for 21 days through the mountains and around three towns, avoiding the Japanese troops, to get there. They ate mostly sugar cane from abandoned fields. When they arrived, they stayed with her father's friends.

About one-and-a-half years later, in 1946, the pastor in HengYang sent a letter telling them that all the Sisters had returned but them. (She was

always amazed that the letter reached her, since the country's mail system wasn't functional.) They walked for 21 days back to Ling Ling and then took a car to Heng Yang. Although the convent was all but ruined, the sisters professed final vows. Sr. Cecilia professed vows on April 17, 1947.

In 1949 Communism began to take hold in Mainland China, and once again the sisters fled, this time to Hong Kong for three months and then to Macau. (Some sisters went ahead to the United States.) In

Macau, they had the job of cooking for the seminarians. Then in 1951 Sr. Cecilia and Sister Theresa were the first Sisters from China to arrive as helpers at St. Clare's Retreat in California.

Mother Leola and Sister Hubertine with some sisters came over to America a year later in May and June of 1952. Sister Cecilia helped with the retreat ministry, cooking and cleaning retreatant rooms. She also was sacristan. During this time she taught herself English.

In 1958, Sr. Cecilia moved to Our Lady of Peace Retreat Convent where she worked next door at St. Mary's Home for Boys. Leaving in 1972 for Taiwan, Sister spent time doing catechetical work, returning to Beaverton in 1986 with Sister Theresa. After that she spent time in the congregation's convents in Canada and Gallup, New Mexico.

When Sister Cecilia moved to Richmond, British Columbia, in 1994, she helped open the new Convent on Gilbert Street. She worked at St. Joseph the Worker Parish in Richmond and at St. Francis Xavier Parish in Vancouver, which had many Chinese parishioners.

In more recent years, Sister traveled about on her motorized scooter here in Beaverton doing odd jobs around the convent and retreat house. She also enjoyed reading the Chinese newspapers, working on her stamp collection and taking plants to and from her indoor houseplant hospital, where she would revive drooping ones and then return them to grateful owners. Sr. Cecilia admitted she "liked to do everything," and was a jack of all trades. She was a selfless pioneer in faith, the last of the congregation's second class of members.

Franciscan Fioretti

Several years ago in our newsletter, we included the “Novena of Abandonment to Jesus”, written by an Italian priest, Servant of God, Father Dolindo Ruotolo, a secular Franciscan, who lived from 1882 until 1970 in Naples, Italy where he was known for his personal holiness and miracles. We heard favorable comments from our readers, so in this newsletter, we share with you his meditations on the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary.—excerpted from Meditations on the Holy Rosary of Mary. Translated by Giovanna Invitti Ellis, 1999.

FIRST JOYFUL MYSTERY: THE ANNUNCIATION

Jesus: You become too anxious in the way you live and too impulsive in the way you act. Always perform your tasks without hurrying. Look first for the Divine Will in everything you do, offering yourself to God, in Mary’s words: “Behold your handmaid, O Lord. Be it done to me according to Your Word.”

The soul: O my Jesus, allow me to understand the mysteries of Your love for me, so that I may do only Your will. I have not been grateful for Your love for me and often I am doubtful. Now I do believe in Your love and I offer myself to You: Ecce Ancilla Domini, Behold the handmaid of the Lord.

SECOND JOYFUL MYSTERY: THE VISITATION TO ST. ELISABETH

Jesus: You make many sacrifices for others, but you do not always make them for God. Never work for human convenience, but only for the virtue of charity. Call on the Most Holy Mary, that she may come to sanctify your soul for the glory of God: Magnificat anima mea Dominum, My soul magnifies the Lord.

The soul: Deign, O my Jesus, to turn Your Face toward this insignificant one of Yours. You give Yourself to me, real and alive in the Holy Eucharist, with Your infinite love. May I never be ungrateful for this gift. I beg You, and may I glorify You with all my love: Magnificat anima mea Dominum, My soul magnifies the Lord.

THIRD JOYFUL MYSTERY: THE BIRTH OF JESUS

Jesus: Everyday I come to you in the Holy Eucharist and everyday I rest in you as in the stable of Bethlehem. I was born in the silence of the night and in the silence of love I want to work in your soul. Do not waste My gift with anxiety of soul. Trust in Me because I am faithful and will not permit in you the evil of deceit and illusion.

The soul: Come, O my Jesus, I believe in You. I adore You. Come into my poor heart and let me warm You with my love. I believe it is You who comes to me and I want to be faithful to You till death.

FOURTH JOYFUL MYSTERY: THE PRESENTATION OF THE CHILD JESUS IN THE TEMPLE

Jesus: The most Holy Mary presented Me in the Temple and you present Me to God in the Eucharistic offering, through the hands of Mary. When I sacrifice Myself in you, you accept the sorrows of your life just as Mary accepted the sorrows prophesied to Her by the saintly old Simeon. Be faithful to Me in all the discomfort and sorrows of your day. I give you my blessing. _

The soul: Eternal Father, I offer Jesus to You in reparation for my sins and the sins of the whole world. I offer Him up especially for all sins of impurity and that all souls, consecrated to You, may not offend You. I offer You all the sorrows of my life. Jesus I trust in You.

FIFTH JOYFUL MYSTERY: THE FINDING OF YOUNG JESUS DISPUTING WITH THE DOCTORS IN THE TEMPLE

Jesus: How many times I gave Myself to you with great love! and without trusting in Me, you lost Me. When You lose Me, my child, you think I am not yours anymore. Come to the Church and you will find My Tabernacle. Do not become lost in My ways of love. Come to me regularly in the Eucharist. I give you my blessing.

The soul: O my Jesus, my love is for You alone and I want to love You always above all things. Never allow the love of others to prevail in me. I only want to love You who are above all things. In this way I shall never lose You and You will be with me always.
